We have audited the consolidated financial statements of Florence Crittenton Home and Services (the "Home") Florence Crittenton Home and Services Foundation (the "Foundation") as of and for the years ended June 30, 2023, and have issued our report thereon dated April 23, 2024. Professional standards require that we advise you of the following matters relating to our audit.

Our Responsibility in Relation to the Financial Statement Audit

As communicated in our revised engagement letter dated December 7, 2023, our responsibility, as described by professional standards, is to form and express an opinion(s) about whether the financial statements that have been prepared by management with your oversight are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our audit of the financial statements does not relieve you or management of its respective responsibilities.

Our responsibility, as prescribed by professional standards, is to plan and perform our audit to obtain reasonable, rather than absolute, assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit of financial statements includes consideration of internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, as part of our audit, we considered the internal control of the Home and Foundation solely for the purpose of determining our procedures and not to provide any assurance concerning such internal control.

We are also responsible for communicating significant matters related to the audit that are, in our professional judgment, relevant to your responsibilities in overseeing the financial reporting process. However, we are not required to design procedures for the purpose of identifying other matters to communicate to you.

We have provided our findings regarding significant control deficiencies and material weaknesses over financial reporting and material noncompliance, and other matters noted during our audit in the Communication of Internal Control and Related Matters section of this letter.

Planned Scope and Timing of the Audit

We conducted our audit consistent with the planned scope and timing we previously communicated to you.

Compliance with All Ethics Requirements Regarding Independence

The engagement team, others in our firm, as appropriate, and our firm have complied with all relevant ethical requirements regarding independence.

Significant Risks Identified

We have identified the following significant risks: The risk of improper revenue recognition and the risk of management override of controls.

Qualitative Aspects of the Entity's Significant Accounting Practices

Significant Accounting Policies

Management has the responsibility to select and use appropriate accounting policies. A summary of the significant accounting policies adopted by the Home and Foundation is included in Note 1 to the financial statements. As described in Note 1 to the financial statements, during the year, the entity changed its method of accounting for leases by adopting ASU 2016-02, *Leases* (Topic 842). The entity also adopted ASU 2020-10, *Codification Improvements* and ASU 2020-07, *Not-for-Profit Entities* (Topic 958) during the year. The implementation of these standards did not affect net assets previously reported.

No matters have come to our attention that would require us, under professional standards, to inform you about (1) the methods used to account for significant unusual transactions and (2) the effect of significant accounting policies in controversial or emerging areas for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus.

Significant Accounting Estimates

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's current judgments. Those judgments are normally based on knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ markedly from management's current judgments.

The most sensitive accounting estimates affecting the financial statements are:

- Management's estimate of depreciation of property and equipment, which is based on the
 estimated useful life of the asset. We evaluated the key factors and assumptions used to
 develop the estimate in determining the reasonableness of the estimate in relation to the
 financial statements taken as a whole.
- Management's estimate of the fair market value of investments, which is based on market values as reported by third party investment professionals. We evaluated the key factors and assumptions used to develop the estimate of the fair market value of investments in determining that it is reasonable in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Financial Statement Disclosures

Certain financial statement disclosures involve significant judgment and are particularly sensitive because of their significance to financial statement users. The financial statement disclosures are neutral, consistent, and clear.

Significant Unusual Transactions

For purposes of the communication, professional standards require us to communicate to you significant unusual transactions identified during our audit. We did not identify any significant unusual transactions during our audit.

Significant Difficulties Encountered during the Audit

We received the full cooperation of management and believe that we were given direct and unrestricted access to Florence Crittenton's books and records. However, we encountered significant difficulties in performing and completing the audit process within the originally scheduled time frame due to the discovery of the need for a Single Audit. This required a revised engagement letter and additional staffing needs.

Uncorrected and Corrected Misstatements

For purposes of this communication, professional standards also require us to accumulate all misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that we believe are trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Further, professional standards require us to also communicate the effect of uncorrected misstatements to prior periods on the relevant classes of transactions, account balances, or disclosure, and the financial statements as a whole and each applicable opinion unit. Management has corrected all identified misstatements.

Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, professional standards define a disagreement with management as a matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, concerning a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, which could be significant to the Home and Foundation's financial statements or the auditor's report. Management does not agree with finding #2023-002 included in the audit report. Management's response to the finding explains reasons for their disagreement.

Circumstances that Affect the Form and Content of the Auditor's Report

For purposes of this letter, professional standards require that we communicate any circumstances that affect the form and content of our auditor's report. No circumstances affected the form and content of our auditor's report.

Representations Requested from Management

We have requested certain written representations from management that are included in the attached letter dated April 23, 2024.

Management Consultations with Other Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters. Management informed us that, and to our knowledge, there were no consultations with other accountants regarding auditing and accounting matters.

Communication of Internal Control and Related Matters

In planning and performing our audit of the consolidated financial statements of the Home and Foundation as of and for the years ended June 30, 2023, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, we considered the Home and Foundation's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Home and Foundation's internal control over financial reporting.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies, and therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that were not identified. However, as described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs, we identified a certain deficiency in internal control that we consider to be a material weakness.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control over financial reporting, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A reasonable possibility exists when the likelihood of an event occurring is either reasonably possible or probable as defined as follows:

- Reasonably possible. The chance of the future event or events occurring is more than remote but less than likely.
- *Probable*. The future event or events are likely to occur.

We consider the deficiencies described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as items 2023-001 and 2023-002 to be material weaknesses.

Other Significant Matters, Findings, or Issues

In the normal course of our professional association with the Home and Foundation, we generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, significant events or transactions that occurred during the year, operating

and regulatory conditions affecting the entity, and operational plans and strategies that may affect the risks of material misstatement. None of the matters discussed resulted in a condition to our retention as the Home and Foundation's auditors.

Other Findings

- During our testing of fixed assets, we noted that the retainage payable as of June 30, 2023 of \$3,704 was not included in the books as a liability. The amount unaccounted for was trivial, so no adjustment was proposed for the June 30, 2023 audited financial statements. Retainage should be included as a liability in the financial statements, as it represents work that has been completed. We recommend that going forward, the retainage amount be accounted for and included in liabilities, as it is likely to grow to a more material amount as construction progresses.
- As a part of our audit procedures, we tested 26 cash disbursements for proper supporting
 documentation and accounting treatment. One of the cash disbursements tested was for
 \$463.54 spent at Walmart. Two receipts from Walmart were provided for this disbursement that
 added up to \$466.46, so it appears that an incorrect receipt was attached to this disbursement.
 Management searched records for the correct receipt, but could not locate it. We recommend
 that all receipts be checked for accuracy prior to attaching them to the applicable cash
 disbursement.
- During the course of the audit, four reclassifying entries were needed to correct the following items:
 - o Correct the classification of grant receivable vs. patients receivable
 - o Correct the classification of the donations from the Washington Foundation
 - Correct the classification of certain Medicaid funding
 - Correct the classification of investment activity

The above items were corrected, as shown in the attached schedule of audit adjustments, and the financial statements reflect these corrections. We recommend that all revenue and expense accounts for the Home and Foundation be reviewed for proper classification prior to the start of the annual audit.

- During the course of reviewing grants receivable as of June 30, 2023, we noted the following:
 - o Included in grants receivable as of June 30, 2023 was \$16,272.13 in unspent grant funds that were received on November 15, 2022.
 - Grants receivable did not include \$10,852.03 in VOCA funds that were expended in June of 2023 and receivable as of June 30, 2023.

The above items were corrected, as shown in the attached schedule of audit adjustments, and the financial statements reflect these corrections. We recommend that grants receivable be reviewed for accuracy and completeness prior to the start of the annual audit.

During the audit we reviewed quarterly expense reports submitted to the state detailing how
funds for the stabilization grants were allocated (used and/or spent). We noted that the
quarterly reported amounts for three quarters tested in each of the grants could not be agreed
back to the QuickBooks Online accounting records. See the table below for the variances
identified. We recommend that supporting documentation for all reported grant expenditures be
retained and filed in an orderly manner in order to substantiate costs reported as used or spent
for grant programs.

Recent Accounting Pronouncements

• ASU 2016-13, Financial Instruments – Credit Loses (Topic 326), which is effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2022. This ASU changes the allowance for credit losses accounting model by requiring recognition of management's estimates of current expected credit losses (CECL). The new model is applicable to all financial instruments thereby bringing consistency in accounting treatment across different types of financial instruments and requiring consideration of a broader range of variables when forming loss estimates. This standard broadens the information that an entity must consider in developing its expected credit loss estimate for assets measured either collectively or individually. A CECL analysis must reflect the nature of the credit portfolio and the economic environment, as they exist at the specific reporting date. Although measurement under the new methodology is based on relevant information about past events, including historical experience, now management also must consider current conditions and a broader range of reasonable and supportable information to make credit loss estimates for certain financial assets.

Other Matters

With respect to the supplementary information accompanying the financial statements, we made certain inquiries of management and evaluated the form, content, and methods of preparing the information to determine that the information complies with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles, the method of preparing it has not changed from the prior period, and the information is appropriate and complete in relation to our audit of the financial statements. We compared and reconciled the supplementary information to the underlying accounting records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves.

This representation letter is provided in connection with your audit of the financial statements of Florence Crittenton Home and Services (the "Home") Florence Crittenton Home and Services Foundation (the "Foundation"), which comprise the consolidated statements of financial position as of June 30, 2023 and 2022, and the related consolidated statements of activities and changes in net assets, consolidated cash flows, and consolidated functional expenses for the years then ended and the related notes to the consolidated financial statements, for the purpose of expressing an opinion as to whether the financial statements are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States (U.S. GAAP).

Certain representations in this letter are described as being limited to matters that are material.
